

FROM THE CO-PRESIDENT

National Freedom to Marry Day was celebrated last week, however media coverage of this event was rather limited. This 'holiday' was launched several years ago by the Lambda Legal Defense Fund to draw attention to the inequities and challenges gay couples face. This year, in Bethlehem PA, it was marked by six gay and lesbian couples taking vows to love, respect and protect each other until death do they part. 32 other gay and lesbian couples celebrated by receiving blessings on their relationships from clergy of the United Church of Christ, Mennonite, Methodist, Unitarian, and Reconstructionist Synagogue faith traditions. In PA, as in most of the states, such ceremonies are largely symbolic, and serve to remind us that much remains to be accomplished before same-sex couples can enjoy the same benefits and rights as their straight counterparts.

However, the times, they are a-changin! It is much easier if you don't live in the US. The Netherlands and Belgium recognize gay and lesbian marriages, France is considering similar legislation, and closer to home, so is Canada. We celebrated when Vermont became the first state to grant same sex couples Civil Unions, and held our breath as the legislation survived the first challenges. California may be next -AB 205 was introduced in the CA state assembly the first week of February, and would create a system of Civil Unions giving same sex couples most of the same rights and responsibilities as 'marriage'.

Even here in PA we have had some Good News. My e-mail box is full of the reports that Temple will be the first public University to offer health benefits to domestic partners of gay employees. This will be implemented

February Program

March Program

The March program will feature a speaker from The Seven Project, one of the collaborators (along with Persad and the GLCC) on Voices for a New Tomorrow: An Assessment of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Community of Allegheny County. The Seven Project is "An AIDS Service Organization Serving the Black Community" primarily, but is, in fact, open to and welcomes everyone. We will learn about this important organization and how PFLAG can better reach out to the local African-American community. Please come for this very worthwhile program.

April Program

The April program will feature a presentation by attorney Kathryn Hens-Greco. Kathryn is a family law attorney and has spent a good part of the last 17 years representing gay and lesbian families as they negotiate our legal system dealing with issues of adoption, custody, support, wills, guardianships and

estate planning. We have had a year with many long awaited positive changes in the law through the courts and she will be discussing these developments and answer questions. Please come for this informative program.

through 3 unions that represent about 40% of Temple’s employees. Inequities remain, but it is a step in the right direction. Temple’s rationale is that to compete with private universities for quality employees, they need to offer comparable benefits: ah, the justice of the market place.

Are you listening, Pitt?

Undoubtedly, the decision by Temple will receive attention from our State legislators; Rep. Daryl Metcalfe, R-Cranberry said, “I— advance the position we should defund them totally. I certainly will advance that position.” Another stated, “The Legislature likely would be reluctant to support a university that would make such a move.” The battle lines are drawn.

So much struggle for so little gain. How can we help, short of becoming full-time lobbyists and moving to Harrisburg (or Washington, DC)? First, as always, we can be OUT. It is amazing how many families have a GLBT ‘connection’ once you share yours. The more people that become acquainted with GLBT individuals and their families and understand that we are more like them than different, the broader the support for progressive moves - like the recent actions of Temple - and the less for retroactive attitudes - like Pitt’s. Talk with your state legislators -or send letters-or e-mail, now and when the issues come up for discussion in Harrisburg. Let them know you support fairness and equal rights for GLBTs, whether it is in relationships, employment, or housing.

We enjoy many privileges, most of which we take for granted. Reflect on your marriage, and the legal protections and securities it provides. It is time to extend those rights and responsibilities to all in committed relationships.

Once the group is established in March, it will be closed to new members during its four-month run. Alison Wolfson and Vic Zuraw will co-facilitate the group.

A Growth Group is designed to serve members who have a specific GLBT-related goal they wish to accomplish with the help of a supportive group. As in all of our sharing groups, the standard guidelines apply with one major exception. Whereas in traditional groups we speak in the first person and do not offer advice, in the Growth Group, it is generally understood that members invite and actively seek the advice and ideas of others.

Members who participated in the Growth Group that was offered for the first time last year were extremely enthusiastic about the progress they made on their chosen goals and the bonds they established with fellow group members. People tackled goals ranging from establishing a PFLAG chapter in a dubiously welcoming church, challenging oneself to be more vocal on GLBT issues and becoming a part of PFLAG's Speaker's Bureau, and increasing networking opportunities and abilities in the GLBT community.

If you are looking for some support in moving forward on a particular issue, consider joining this powerful group. As you think about the goal you wish to tackle, consider the following criteria: your goal should be 1) specific, 2) measurable, and 3) attainable.

"Joan of Arc" is Coming to Pittsburgh April 11 for One Special Performance

The underground lesbian classic, "The Second Coming of Joan" of Arc, will be performed in Pittsburgh this spring. Playwright and performer Carolyn Gage brings her award-winning, one-woman show to the Eddy Theatre located on the campus of Chatham College Friday, April 11*. Showtime is 8:00 p.m. A portion of the proceeds from "The Second Coming of Joan of Arc" will benefit the Gay & Lesbian Community Center (GLCC) of Pittsburgh.

In Gage's interpretation, Joan is a teenaged lesbian runaway who has returned from the dead to share her harrowing experiences, as well as her passionate and radical perspective. The play was a national finalist for the Lambda Literary Award and it won the Oregon Book Award. The play has been performed in hundreds of women's theatres, festivals, and conferences, and was featured on National Public Radio.

Carolyn Gage is the author of more than forty plays and three books on lesbian theatre. "Joan represents one of the most censored archetypes in theatre history - not just the lesbian, and not just the butch, but the angry young woman," said Gage. "People who see the show are electrified by this energy - not because young women aren't enraged - they are - but because it is so taboo to show it on the stage."

In the decade since the first performance of the play, The Second Coming of Joan of Arc has had a remarkable history and impact. Thousands of photocopied versions of the script have been passed from hand to hand. Women who have never been involved in theatre have been inspired to become first-time producers in order to bring "Joan" to their local communities. Doctoral students have written about it; university professors have included it in their curricula; therapists have prescribed it for their patients. Women have credited the play for their actions: leaving their marriages, quitting their jobs, confronting their perpetrators.

From Cranberry with Hate

State Representative Daryl Metcalfe is at it again. Metcalfe represents the tier of Butler County communities that border Allegheny County. This Cranberry legislator certainly detests LGBT rights. For example, Temple University recently decided to subsidize health insurance for same sex partners of its employees. In response, Metcalfe threatened to take away funding from the state-related university. Temple's move was hailed by some Pittsburgh LGBT activists as a victory since the university has a semi-autonomous position analogous to that of the University of Pittsburgh. Other activists noted that Temple employees would have to pay up to \$400 a month for such insurance, a rate above market. Still, the February 15 edition of the *Pittsburgh Post Gazette* quoted the following statement from Metcalfe: "I know I for one [sic] as will a number of my colleagues, advance the position we should defund them totally."

In this stand, Metcalfe joins another Western Pennsylvania legislator, Jeff Coleman who represents the Apollo and Kittanning areas. Coleman, a twenty-eight year old bachelor, lived up to his training from Jerry Falwell's Liberty University. He declared himself "reluctant to support" any such university.

Metcalfe is most familiar to this PFLAGer for defying the Republican Party caucus in his stand against the Hate Crimes bill last November. Metcalfe decried the bill for defining sexual orientation as a protected category. Said Metcalfe, "This would be the first time the Commonwealth would have encoded an abomination into law."

Transgender Activists See Gains in Their Battle Against Bias

Violence against their disparate community persists; so do legal setbacks. Yet these are heady days for transgender activists as they strengthen their lobbying efforts and gain civil rights protections in city after city.

"We have a lot of work to do, but we are winning," said Mara Keisling, an activist from Harrisburg, Pa., who is helping establish a new transgender-rights center in Washington, D.C.

The past year was one of pronounced highs and lows for the movement.

On the downside, transgender people commemorated 25 members of their community killed during the previous year in what activists considered to be hate crimes...

Offsetting those developments, transgender-rights advocates won an unprecedented series of political victories last year. The governing councils of 14 cities and counties - including Baltimore, Boston, Chicago,

Dallas, New York and Philadelphia - voted to include transgender people among the groups protected by local nondiscrimination laws.

Reflecting on the grass roots success of "Joan" Gage said, "It's about making meaningful connections. Women, in particular, experience the play while wrapped up in their own private guilt and shame. As it unfolds, they make connections between Joan's experiences and their own to see that there is a pattern, a conspiracy going on. The atmosphere changes, as a result — the women come alive, with anger and with humor. There is just this tremendous release."

Gary McKillop, who is overseeing this special fund raising event for the GLCC commented, "The GLCC has a good working relationship with Chatham College and we hope to do more with Chatham College and its SASO (Students Against Sexual Oppression) organization in the future. Chatham's commitment to developing World Ready Women™ makes it a perfect environment to hold such an event."
